Forty years ago, two great education advocacy groups—one historically white, the other historically black—joined together with a single purpose: to ensure that every child in Georgia had access to a quality public education.

The members of the Georgia Teachers & Education Association (GT&EA) and the Georgia Education Association (GEA) were truly courageous as they worked together to move past old divides and to embrace a new vision for what public schools in Georgia could be.

On May 9, 1970, the first joint Representative Assembly was held in Macon, Georgia. GAE was born.

Today, that shared vision of the members for GT&EA and GEA still guides our work. On our 40th Anniversary, we celebrate our proud heritage and honor the determination, the vision, and the passion for public education that united educators in the belief in the promise of public schools for all.

GAE recently honored Lois Butler as the 2010 Annie Hutchinson ESP of the Year. A member of the Worth County Association of Educators, Lois Butler works diligently to communicate vital education and association news to her colleagues. Not only does she work to serve the members of GAE, but she reaches out to support all educators regardless of professional affiliation. Butler wholeheartedly lives by the creed: "Every child deserves a quality education." In her day-to-day interactions with her students, she goes beyond the call of duty to make certain her students are properly accommodated and upholds the law, regulations for students with special needs. Ms. Butler has repeatedly demonstrated that she is a true advocate dedicated to the enhancement of education.

This year, GAE honored Lois Butler as ESP of the Year at the Spring Representative Assembly Awards Banquet. As the GAE ESP of the Year, Lois Butler will serve as GAE's nominee for the NEA ESP of the Year Award.

With 3.2 million members, the National Education Association is the largest employee organization in the country. Today, nearly half a million ESPs are members of NEA—making NEA the largest organization of school support employees in the world.

The NEA Representative Assembly approved a special annual honor, the NEA Education Support Professionals Award, to further emphasize the contributions of Education Support Professionals to their schools and communities. This national award recognizes

GAE also recognized the leadership of members who have diligently served on the GAE Board of Directors.



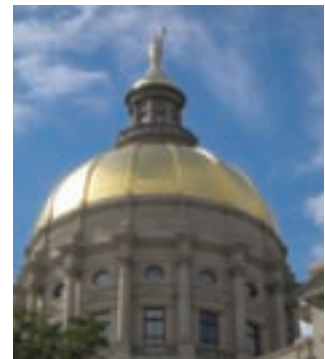
